

OECD average = 1.09


Highest Norway = 1.43


Lowest Korea & Netherlands = 0.62







National Regulated Workforce Demographics






Dental Therapists



Te Toka Tumai Hospital & Specialist Dental Service


Serves Metro Auckland – all ages, is a hospital specialist service
















Staff experience themes



Other key comments

- Pay was not in scope of the project, but it was often part of the conversation
- Preventive services currently operating as relief of pain unable to meet all needs. Impacts of closedowns during COVID-19.
- Ratios of dental assistants to clinicians was seen as problematic, which seemed more related to recruitment and retention, than available FTE
- Mentorship and supervision impacted by high clinical demands
- Recruitment and retention cycles (staff turn-over) for OHTs in ARDS were considered high. Difficulty recruiting dental specialists and dental assistants in Te Toka Tumai Hospital Dental Specialist Services
- Rurality remains a factor for Te Tai Tokerau
- Population growth (incl. new schools) services and planning keeping pace
- Worries over the ongoing impact of COVID-19




